

O'Hara runs by Neumann

PHILADELPHIA - It's becoming increasingly apparent that Catholic League frontrunner Cardinal O'Hara High has two of the best running backs around.

Steve Andrien and Ed Tulsie both have rushed for over 600 yards in O'Hara's six games despite the fact that each has missed a game because of an injury.

"I can't see where there are two better backs on any one high school team around," said O'Hara coach Bob Ewing.

Few will argue with Ewing. Sunday, the pair turned in another outstanding effort, Tulsie rushing for 160 yards and a touchdown and Andrien rushing for 125 yards and two touchdowns. Neither played during the fourth quarter of the Lions' 21-6 win over home-standing Bishop Neumann.

The win boosted O'Hara's record to 6-0 and sets the stage for next Sunday's game against Archbishop Carroll.

Last year, O'Hara entered the Carroll game with a 5-0 record and was beaten, 15-14.

"We've been stressing since Aug. 15 (the first day of practice) that we don't look ahead to anyone," said Ewing. "We've played it like that all year. We haven't even mentioned Carroll. It's just another big game for us."

Ewing and his team are aware, however, that Carroll has a splendid passing combination of quarterback Doug Guyer and receiver Kevin Mullen.

"They could be as good a high school passing combination as I've seen in my 13 years in coaching," Ewing said. "Mullen is just an outstanding receiver and the key is that when Mullen gets open, Guyer doesn't overthrow him. We have the greatest respect for them."

But, conversely, Carroll must respect O'Hara's running tandem of Andrien and Tulsie.

Andrien opened the scoring against Neumann on a five-yard run in the second quarter.

Later in the period, Tulsie tallied on a 68-yard option play.

Ewing credited quarterback Jim Wenke for his hand in Tulsie's touchdown.

"Jimmy went about eight yards with the ball, with Tulsie trailing," Ewing said. "Just when the safety came up to tackle him, he pitched to Tulsie. It was a heck of a play."

Andrien scored again in the third quarter on a 12-yard run before Neumann pushed across its lone touchdown in the fourth period against O'Hara's substitutes.

Ewing said O'Hara's offensive line was "blowing holes in their defensive line." He credited the play of center Steve Suggen, guards Jeff McCready and Rick Costello and tackles Gerry Feehrey and Joe Levda.

"Our lines just dominated their lines," Ewing said.

Good defensive games were turned in by ends Jerry Penrose and Greg Cordes, linebackers Mark Hamilton and Jim Myers and junior tackle Jerry Hoffman.

Norristown blanked

One Moore win for unbeaten MN

MARPLE - "To me, he was the key to the ball game," Marple Newtown High football coach Bob Kenig said of his punter, Timmy Moore, after Marple shut out visiting Norristown, 12-0, Saturday and kept its season record spotless at 6-0.

Moore punted nine times for a 42-yard average. Two punts went for 61 and 58 yards. More significantly, four of his punts carried inside the 10-yard line, including two which rolled out of bounds inside the five.

"He's the type of kid who does a great job under pressure," said Kenig.

Kenig found that out in last week's win over Ridley. Moore, who was the backup punter entering the Ridley game, came on and did a good job against Ridley after Marple's regular punter was injured.

Moore's punts kept Norristown in the hole most of the afternoon. It's a good thing, too, because Marple wasn't able to muster much of an offense against Norristown's big defense.

"We didn't have a good offensive day," admitted Kenig. "They did an excellent defensive job against us. They were immense. We've never played against anybody that big. Their defensive tackles were 235 and 240 pounds, the ends were both 200 and the linebackers were 190 and 195. Plus, their defense is exceptionally well-coached."

Marple's defense was also pretty stingy, allowing Norristown

only 92 yards total offense. Two of the stars were linebacker Joe Nutley and back Curt Worley. Worley had two interceptions, Nutley one.

Marple scored with 49 seconds remaining in the first half when George Schmidt dashed 55 yards with a fumble, and again late in the fourth quarter on Joe Wenner's one-yard plunge.

And how does it feel to be 6-0? "Just great," said Kenig. "I'm most happy for our kids. They've worked hard and I'm glad for them."

"And the assistant coaches are doing a tremendous job. We wouldn't be anywhere near 6-0 without them."

Marple hosts St. Mark's Friday, then closes the season with four Central League games.

"St. Mark's does everything well," Kenig said. "Ridley beat them, 7-0. St. Mark's is as close to Ridley as any team around and we had a real tough battle with Ridley."

"Playing teams like Norristown and St. Mark's keeps you competitive," said Kenig.

Massi leads Swarthmore



Zawoiski over 100 again

Widener halts Hopkins, has happy Homecoming

CHESTER — Widener College recorded its 10th straight Homecoming victory Saturday with the help of running back Chip Zawoiski, who rushed for over 100 yards for the fifth time this season.

The Old Grads went home happy as their Alma Mater beat Johns Hopkins University, 17-6, raising its record to 4-1 overall and 4-0 in the Middle Atlantic Conference.

"We moved the ball well but were frustrated when it came to scoring," said Widener coach Bill Manlove. "Penalties and mistakes hurt us badly."

Widener racked up 312 total yards, but was hampered by nine penalties for 98 yards.

As late as 8:16 in the fourth quarter, Widener was hanging on to a 10-6 lead, after Hopkins quarterback Joel Hansen threw a 10-yard scoring pass to Bruce Kane, who was all alone in the end zone. The scoring drive was set up by Ray Reed's interception of Mark Walter's pass in the end zone.

Widener's first touchdown came early in the second quarter on an eight-yard run by Zawoiski. The 66-yard drive was kept alive by a 20-yard pass to split end Walker Carter on third-and-18.

The game was highlighted by the superb running of Zawoiski, who compiled an impressive 187 yards on 29 carries, a 6.4 yard average. His rushing total for this season is 635 yards.

"Our offensive line came off the ball well and controlled the line of scrimmage," Manlove said.

On Widener's first possession, it drove all the way to the 6 but, after a five-yard penalty and two incomplete passes, had to settle for a 28-yard field goal by John Ferko.

Ferko, a sophomore, repeatedly sent his kickoffs out of the end zone, denying any return by the Blue Jays.

The Widener fans got more excitement than they bargained for late in the fourth quarter, when Hansen, with less than four minutes remaining and his team down


by only four points, barely overthrew receiver Joe Dlin, who had his defender beat at the 20.

Widener then took over on downs at the 26 and four plays later got its second TD on another eight-yard run by Zawoiski with 37 seconds left.

Widener hosts undefeated Franklin & Marshall next Saturday at 2 p.m. The outcome could very well decide the league championship.

"We'll have our hands full next week," said Manlove. "They are a good football team and we have yet to prove ourselves. We need that win."

Dodgers pound Gullett, stay alive

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The New York Yankees wanted to end the World Series with a victory in the fifth game, but the longball proved to be starting pitcher Don Gullett's undoing.

Despite a 3-2 game lead in the Series, Manager Billy Martin and the other Yankees did not take the 10-4 loss to the Los Angeles Dodgers lightly.

Martin was asked if he felt confident about an eventual win in the Series which takes up again Tuesday night in New York.

"No, I'm scared to death," he said.

Martin first said he would start

Ed Figueroa in the sixth game and, when asked about a possible seventh game starter, he said, "I'm not talking about that."

A persistent reporter asked him if he would use Mike Torrez, third game winner, in the seventh game and he shook his head and said, "No, we're saving Torrez for spring training."

Later, Martin checked with the Yankee trainer who told him Figueroa "was not a hundred percent" because of a sore finger on his pitching hand and the manager switched to Torrez for the sixth game.

Gullett was tagged for a triple by the first Dodger batter, Davey

Lopes, Sunday and that keynoted the game. Bill Russell singled to bring Lopes home for a 1-0 Dodger lead.

Steve Garvey doubled off Gullett with one out in the fourth to start a four-run rally, capped by Steve Yeager's three-run homer.

There were two Yankee errors in the big Dodger inning — by third baseman Graig Nettles and by left fielder Lou Piniella — and one of the runs was unearned.

"Gullett just did not have his control," said Martin. "He threw a forkball to Yeager and got it up around his eyes, and he hit it out."

Gullett was behind most of the Dodger batters right from the start. He made 25 pitches in the first inning alone. The muscular left-hander was touched for eight hits and seven runs in the 4 1-3 innings he worked.

The Yankees got two runs in the seventh on a pair of singles by Jackson and Chris Chambliss and a double by Nettles off Don Sutton who went all the way.

Reggie Jackson and Thurman Munson hit back-to-back homers in the eighth for the final Yankee runs.

Piniella and Jackson said the sun bothered them in the outfield at Dodger Stadium.

"It was real tough out there today," said Jackson. "The sun and the smog were bad, but that's not why we lost."

Lopes got on base and created movement. The Dodgers had a little scrappiness and they kept the movement going.

"Sutton did not overpower you, but he had good location and he throws the ball where he wants it."

Jackson pointed to the Yankees' one-game lead in the best-of-seven series, and said:
