Shuts out St. Mark's 7-0 Marple Newtown stays undefeated

MARPLE - There is a religious slogan often seen on billboards and bumper stickers that says, "I Found It."

Marple Newtown High School football coach Bob Kenig found religion long before someone thought up that slogan and he often brings it out, especially after a big victory. He has his rosary beads in his pocket at every game.

Kenig and his staff can say following Friday night's 7-0 victory over powerful St. Mark's of Wilmington, Del., "We Found It," and they won't be referring to religion to religion.

What they found was a chink in the mighty Spartans' armor.

"They were so concerned about (Quarterback) Jock Peterson turning the corner on them, that they had their defensive ends playing wide. "That left the dive play open. It's a play we haven't used all

year. (Running back) George Schmidt kept saying, 'the dive will go, the dive will go,' and that's what we went to most of the time in our touchdown drive," said Kenig, whose Tigers are 7-0.

The TD drive was one of perfect execution and great effort.

The Tigers, who were much smaller than St. Mark's, drove 75 yards in 19 time-consuming plays before Joe Wenner followed the blocks of Eric Rice, Scott Lehman and Joe Nutley into the end zone from one-yard out with 7:19 remaining in the game.

The Tigers picked up five of their game-total eight first downs on the drive.

"Craig Wolf was the key man in the drive," said Kenig. "We'd run the dive, he would take that end out and we would veer then to the outside for extra yardage," said Kenig.

Wolf, a 6-3, 207-pound junior tight end, looked a bit different after the game than he did before the kickoff. He had skin on his nose before the game. The missing hide didn't seem

to bother him.

He smiled when he was told Coach Kenig said it was his blocking against the St. Mark's defensive end that played a big part in the TD drive.

"Their end was playing wide and trying to slant in. That made it easier for me to block him," said Wolf, seemingly trying to shy away from a hero role. Marple's TD drive followed

some great Tiger defense that turned back a St. Mark's bid that was set up by a short punt.

The Spartans had moved it to the MN 20 where they faced 2ndand-8.

St. Mark's quarterback Sean McCall tried the option-right, but Lehman put so much pressure on him that he pitched back wildly to Ron Clark and the play lost 13 yards.

After Frank Cephous picked up eight to the 25, Wenner fired through on a passing situation to make McCall unload the ball to keep from getting sacked and MN took over on its own 25.

The big plays in the TD drive were a 13-yard Peterson to Schmidt pass on 3rd-and-5, a 10yard blast on the dive by Tim Lambert on 3rd-and-3, a seven yard keeper by Peterson on 3rdand-5, a five yard getaway by Kurt Worley on 4th-and-1, and a four-yard charge by Peterson on 4th-and-1.

Peterson's run, which was through a pathway made by Nutley, Rice and Lehman, put the ball on the 1-yard line.

Wenner was stopped on his first assault from there, but on his second, he took it in with room to Nutley, who delivered one of the key blocks, played his first

full game at offensive guard in two years. 'I played some last week after

Perce Alston got hurt, but it was only for about half a game, "When I was told I would be

playing both offense and defense this game, I was a little worried about getting tired. So I worked extra hard in practice, hoping to be in as good a shape as possible. "I didn't get tired," said Nutley, who certainly didn't look

tired on that game-winning block. The contest was dominated by

defense most of the time. Sideliners were talking about a scoreless tie before MN found the

solution. MN had eight first downs to seven for St. Mark's and led in total offense, 236 to 65.

MN's big play defense kept St. Mark's off balance. It sacked McCall three times for 27 yards,

and stopped St. Mark's on seven other plays for losses totaling 36 yards.

MN lost ground (seven yards) on only two plays. NOTEABLE - Lehman almost

O'Hara to be tested

MARPLE— If Archbishop Carroll loses its game to Cardinal O'Hara Iligh here Sunday afternoon, there's no one left who can stop the Lions in their run for the Catholic League's Southern Suburban Division Section

championship. That's the way Carroll coach Jim Bowes sized up the game which begins at 2 p.m. at Marple Newtown High's field.

"You could say it's for the (section) title," Bowes said, following a week of intensive practice. "I don't see O'Hara losing after our game."

The Patriots (4-2, 2-1) face a do-or-die situation. The Lions are undefeated (6-0) and own a 3-0 league mark.

In another Catholic League game Sunday, St. James (1-5, 0-3) travels to Upper Darby High for a meeting with Monsignor Bonner (2-4, 1-2).

Cardinal O'Hara coach Bob Ewing isn't looking beyond Sunday's game. The Lions aren't a 'shoo-in' for the championship yet. O'Hara still has to meet St. Joseph's Prep, Bonner and West.

"Our kids have been preparing for this game all season," Ewing said. "They want this one bad. I just hope they don't get so ex-cited about Carroll they don't play their game. It's important not not to overestimate or underestimate your opponent.

If O'Hara is to win Sunday, the Lions will have to find a way to stop the passing combination of Doug Guyer and Kevin Mullen. Mullen, the hero in last year's City championship game when he was the favorite target of since-graduated QB Nick Becker, has caught ten touchdown passes this season.

Guyer, a 6-3, 165-pound junior with the poise of a senior, has thrown 12 TD passes.

Mullen has good moves and can fly. The 5-10, 160-pound senior pulled a win away from Bonner when he flew past the Friars' safety for the game's final score on a long bomb from Guyer. halfback Senior Brendan Fitzpatrick is also a threat as a receiver. He and Mulien combined their talents in last year's 15-14 upset win over O'Hara after the Lions led, 14-0, at the half. The Lions also must watch tight end Steve Austin, who is 6-3, 180 with good hands and is the team's second-leading receiver. Fullback Joe Kennedy and halfback Mike Santolieri have been the Pa consistent rushers. Patriots' most-O'Hara, which has lost its last three meetings to Carroll, probably has the best-balanced backfield in Delaware County. Lions' runners Steve Andrien and Eddie Tulskie have each gained over 600 yards in five games (they each missed one game due to injury). Also available for ball-carrying duty is 'Medical Marvel' Jimmy Boyd, who overcame knee surgery to rejoin the Lions against St. James. And, if any Ewing needs additional running help, he can always call on Jerry Kilpatrick, his defensive safety who was has been used on offense when any of the other three backs were injured Kilpatrick won Maxwell Award scoring honors for four Martin touchdowns against Luther King then added four more scores against Roman. Quarterback Jim Wenke (5-11, 163) runs O'Hara's Arkansas veer offense like the seasoned veteran he is. Wenke can also throw the football, although the Lions' best game is on the ground. Fran Cassidy, an offensive end, and wide receivers Brian McCann and Steve Siano are dependable pass catchers if O'Hara must take to the air. "We were a little flat against West Catholic," Bowes said. Carroll won the game, 20-12. "Our kids were looking forward to meeting O'Hara, I guess."

McCrae sparks unbeaten Archmere

CONSHOHOCKEN-Archmere Academy quarterback Jim Mc-Crae threw three touchdown passes, a two-point conversion pass and had a two-point conversion run as the undefeated (6-0) Auks turned back a stubborn Archbishop Kennedy leam, 28-20, here Friday night.

Archmere pulled the game out with a fourth-quarter, three-yard touchdown pass from McCrae to Mike Lagasse after Kennedy grabbed a 20-20 tie. Auks' safety Tom Anderson Archmerc's knocked down two last-minute Kennedy passes in the end zone to preserve the win. "I expected a tough ball game

even though they didn't have a

very good record," said Archmere coach Bill Doyle. Kennedy is 2-5 following the loss. "Their quarterback was hurt for three games. He came back recently and is starting to move the team.

"They're a typical hard-hitting bunch of kids."

Don Fondots scored two touchdowns for Kennedy on runs of eight and 24 yards. Nick Sabia got the losers' other score on a 14yard pass from Mike Smith to give Kennedy a 14-12 lead at the half,

Archmere looked like it might win in a breeze after Lagasse and McCrae teamed up for a 38-yard, first-quarter touchdown pass.

Dennis Selfridge then ran three yards to give the Auks a 12-0 lead before Kennedy caught fire.

Fondots' first touchdown and a two-point conversion run early in the second quarter put the host team on board, 12-8. Smith's TD pass to Sabia provided Kennedy with a two-point edge at intermission.

Mark DiNardo, who led all players with 202 yards total offense, gave the edge back to Archmere when he caught Mc-Crae's 45-yard pass early in the third period. McCrae passed to John Ward for the conversion points and a 20-14 lead

But, Kennedy refused to fold. Fondots added a 24-yard TD run to gain a 20-20 tie. And, with time running out, the extra-point attempt was critical. Archmere's Dave McCrae broke through the line to block the PAT try to set the stage for the Auks' final drive.

Archmere marched 65 yards and, on fourth and three, Lagasse caught McCrae's pass for the score. McCrae then ran in the twopoint conversion.

DiNardo led Archmere with 33 carries for 157 yards and one TD pass for 45 yards. The Auks gained 246 yards rushing, 100 passing and 17 first downs.

Kennedy rushed for 121 yards and had 64 yards passing and seven first downs.

"I'm really pleased," Doyle said. "We held them when we had to."
